



In Math, the Fourth Graders are now learning how to divide by one digit numbers. It is important for students to continue practicing their basic multiplication facts, and memorizing the multiplication times table, because division is just reverse-multiplication. We will be developing our understanding of finding quotients and remainders with dividends up to four-digits. Knowing and understanding the steps of division, DMSCBD (Divide, Multiply, Subtract, Check, Bring Down), will be important over these next two

weeks. Please make sure the students are completing their homework assignments. In Science, we are learning about all the cool adaptations that animals have in order to survive, such as camouflage, and behaviors, such as hibernation.



We are nearing the end of our Fictional Narrative writing process. Students will begin to proofread and edit their narratives. We will celebrate their accomplishments by having a publishing party! Students will also begin to read nonfiction texts, and have the opportunity to explore subjects that they find interesting and inspiring. In Social Studies, we will continue to learn about colonial life in New Jersey, early English customs, and early education.

You can be anything you want to be, as long as you're willing to work for it!





The Fifth Grade Math students are ending their long division chapter, where they had to read word problems and interpret the remainder. They had to decide what the question was asking, and after doing the long division, they had to figure out which number they needed for the answer, such as the quotient, remainder, remainder as fraction, or add one to the quotient. Next week, they start dividing decimals. The students will learn about repeating and terminating decimals, and I hope they have the stamina to keep dividing until they see a repeating digit.



Interpreting the Remainder

Drop it!	Add it!

In Science, the Fifth Graders are currently learning about the Earth's spheres: Biosphere, Atmosphere, Geosphere, and Hydrosphere. They learned about how everything in life interacts with one, or all, of these spheres. They will be learning about each sphere more in depth in the coming weeks. The students will learn the layers of the Atmosphere and Geosphere, along with types of rocks, percentages of water on Earth, and what the Biosphere is made up of.

Fifth Graders just finished a unit on Nonfiction in Reading. They really enjoyed learning about the extraordinary young adults, in the class read aloud. Some class favorites included: Greta Thunberg, William Kamkwamba, Laura Dekker, Boyan Slat, Poorna Malavath, and Yeonmi Park. As we read, we were able to locate the countries of origin for each person on the globe, and identify their accomplishments. The students learned how valuable taking notes with main ideas and details helps overall comprehension. Students also read three nonfiction books, on the Raz-Kids site, on their level. In Writing, the focus was on Opinion/Argument writing, and the topic was the debate about banning plastic bags. After reading about Greta and Boyan, many students were even more passionate about the topic, which made for great essays! Well done Fifth Graders! In our next unit, we will read the class fantasy novel by C.S. Lewis, *The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe*. Students will choose a fantasy book, on their level, to read independently for 30 minutes every night. In Writing, the students will choose a topic to write their own Opinion/Argument Essay, since they enjoyed writing their first one so much!



The State Cookie Project tradition at Lincoln School lives on! Students created cookies as state models with cities and landforms, and presented them to their classmates. They then took notes about each state on a master sheet. The students and parents are commended for their effort in participating in this fun and educational project! Our next focus will be on the countries of Central America, and the first people to live in that area.








