



Fifth Grade News: Ms. Carey - Science

In Science, the Fifth grade students are discussing the importance of the hydrosphere, and identifying the ways it interacts with all the spheres on Earth. They are also in the process of creating graphs that illustrate the distribution of all the water on Earth.

The Fifth grade students learned to use benchmarks and the rounding rules to determine reasonable estimates when performing operations with whole numbers and decimals. 


Mrs. Suarez – Language Arts

Mrs. Suarez – Language Arts – cont'd



In Writing, reviewing punctuation has been the focus. The students have sharpened their skills with commas, and are reviewing the use of apostrophes. In Science class, the Sixth grade students are describing forces and the effects they will have on an object. They are using the formula for net force to determine what direction an object will move, and with how much force.







Mr. Kenny - Language Arts and Social Studies

In Mr. Kenny's Language Arts class, we are currently focusing on Character Dynamics, which happens to be one of Mr. Kenny's favorite topics. In Part 2 of *Maniac Magee*, Maniac met a new character named Grayson. The two have a complex relationship, which involves a student-teacher, coach-player, and parent-child relationship, but this proves to be ironic at times. Maniac is actually more of a parental figure and teacher to Grayson, despite Grayson's age! For writing, we finished our Narrative essays and are moving onto our Compare/Contrast essay between *Maniac Magee* and *Remember the Titans*. We will be analyzing both of these narratives. These stories, although similar, have some differences that set the stories apart.

In Social Studies, we are continuing to learn about the Thirteen Colonies. We have finished discussing the Middle and New England Colonies, and

One of the main ideas that we are trying to learn, as a class, is that all of the colonies were set up to make money, but each colony had some differences. For example, the New England Colonies were set up for religious freedom, while the Southern Colonies had large plantations that were set up almost solely as money-making endeavors. Of course, in Mr. Kenny's biased opinion, the Middle Colonies have always been the best place to live, because it has always been a region that regularly accepted others, regardless of their differences, even during the Colonial times.
