

Mrs. Havel Smith & Mr. Rapp – Mathematics


The 5th graders recently completed their chapter on adding and subtracting decimals. They are now learning how to balance their own checkbooks, and use a check register. Do you remember doing this? For the project, the students are logging and

keeping track of "their own" bank accounts, and seeing if unexpected events and expenses have negative or positive consequences. By the end of the two week period, we will see if any, or all, of our 5th graders, and their families, are able to "take a trip" to Disney World. Were they able to save the budgeted amount for their trip, or not? We will see in two weeks! Who's going to Disney World?



Mrs. Suarez - Language Arts

The Fifth graders have been focusing on the genre of Non-Fiction in Reading, as we close out the trimester. Two read alouds include, *Click! The Story of George Eastman*, and *A Tarantula in My Purse and 172 Other Wild Pets*. The students are building on their knowledge of reading this genre and using headings or subheadings as they take notes. They were assigned a biography, on their level, on Raz-Kids, which they completed and reported on. Next, they will read about an animal, bird, or reptile and further build comprehension and note taking skills. The homework, for this genre, has been given for reading on the Raz-Kids site, and note taking.




In Writing, students completed their personal narratives. They are making progress in using dialogue, and many other techniques writers use. In addition, please encourage your children to share their word lists from *Words Their Way* with you. Students need to know their words' meanings with the correct spelling. They have different choices to complete weekly, as they study their words, and the students are encouraged to use different options. Help your child by talking about their words, and suggest some creative options, such as making a comic strip, bubble words, or drawing.



It was great to meet with so many parents, for conferences, this week. Thank you for taking such active roles in your child's education.


Sixth Grade News: Ms. Carey – Science

In Science, the Sixth grade is defining what energy is, and explaining the difference between kinetic and potential energy. They are also researching the different forms of energy we use in our everyday lives.



Mrs. Havel Smith & Mr. Rapp - Mathematics

The 6th graders are currently working on comparing and ordering integers and rational numbers. Due to our first snowstorm, and the temperatures feeling like they are below zero, we are extending our number lines below 0 also. The students are plotting negative and positive rational numbers, and graphing them on the coordinate grid. They are now graphing in all four quadrants, finding distances from two points, and transforming pictures.




Mr. Kenny - Language Arts and Social Studies

In Mr. Kenny's 6th Grade Language Arts class, we are just wrapping up *Maniac Magee*. This very well written story by Jerry Spinelli had intricate and somewhat forgotten "easter eggs" that came back to play into the climax of the story. We reviewed conflict/resolution and the literary structure. In Writing, before the Thanksgiving break, the students completed their literary analysis essays. We learned the acronyms T.A.G.

(Teacher, Author, Genre) and I.C.E. (Introduce an idea, Cite it, then Explain what the citation means to the overall idea). These acronyms should be used as reminders to be successful on all literary analysis essays. As for the month of December, we will be reinforcing our writing skills based on individual needs, then we will begin our persuasive essays in the New Year.



In Social Studies, we just finished Chapter 2, on the colonies. Our historical timeline will now start rapidly accelerating towards war, specifically the French and Indian War, and the American Revolution. With this in mind, I'd like to say "war, whoo, [good God y'all] what is it good for?" -Edwin Starr. In the case of the French and Indian War, it partially led to the American Revolution, due to the monetary issues that come with financing a war. At the end of the day, I think we can all celebrate the American accomplishments that we will be discussing in Chapter 3.



Ecology Club News: Mrs. Coyle, Mrs. Dornan, Mrs. McCullough, and Mrs. Salvatore

This past Tuesday, the Ecology Club participated in a hands-on presentation entitled, "Wonderful Working Worms". Using a traveling compost bin, Mrs. Bonano-Lynch, from the Bergen County Utilities Authority, helped the students explore the world of composting. They learned the difference between worm composting, which can be done indoors, and outdoor composting. The children also learned that worms do not have eyes or teeth, so you can pick them up, but you must be gentle! All of the Ecology Club members were given a pencil case filled with stickers, bookmarks, and pencils made from recycled material.












Technology News: Ms. Fares
