




English as a Second Language News: Mrs. Salvatore

Enrichment/Gifted and Talented News: Mrs. Morris

Enrichment and Gifted and Talented classes are off to a fresh start in the New Year! The Kindergarten and First grades enjoyed hearing *The Snowy Day* and *The History of Snow.* Students then used dice to identify (Kindergarten) and add (First grade) numbers

to complete the snowflakes. The Second grade has also begun a unit on snowflakes. We read Snowflake Bentley, the true story of Wilson Bentley, the first person to photograph a snowflake. We will be studying the concept of symmetry through the natural beauty of snowflakes, as well as creating our own beautiful snowflakes. Third grade G & T students have been introduced to Morse Code. Students practiced decoding and creating messages. They will use their knowledge to create a new twist to the fairy



tale "Little Red Riding Hood", and help save Grandma. In collaboration with Ms. Collova (district art teacher), the Fourth graders are studying Picasso's guitars. Students will study Picasso's creations and replicate their own guitars. Using Makey Makey kits, copper tape, and computer coding, we will be able to play our creations! I am really





Library News: Ms. Raimo

Snowflakes, Snowmen, & Symmetry, Oh My! While the weather outside has **not** been frightful so far this winter, it's all about 'snow' in Library classes. After learning about the antics of "Snowmen at Night", the Kindergarteners illustrated themselves as snow boys/snow girls. The 1st graders sketched "How To's" on how to build a snowman after reading "The Biggest Snowman Ever". The 2nd, 3rd, & 4th graders learned about the life and times of "The Snow Globe Family". They compared and contrasted the lives of the regular family vs. the Snow Globe family, found evidence in the text that showed

how small the Snow Globe Family was, and developed outlines of the type of snow globes they would like to live in. BrainPOPJr. gave the 5th grade an in-depth look into winter weather patterns, and the 6th graders were introduced to "Snowflake Bentley", who took real pictures of snowflakes using microphotography. The students practiced their symmetry skills by sketching snowflake halves. Even though it was challenging to draw the mirror images, the students prevailed!

Happy New Year and welcome back to school! Kindergarten, 1st and 2nd graders are singing spiritual songs that Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. would have sung in anticipation of Black History Month. Spirituals and work songs are important to the development of all American music – blues, jazz and rock. 3rd grade will continue their journey, learning to play the recorder, culminating in an appearance at the Spring Concert. The 4th grade students are learning music terms. 5th graders are learning about classical music, and the 6th grade students are becoming acquainted with American jazz music. The Lincoln School students have been learning about Computer Science. They

learned the programming language, Blockly, by working on Puppy Adventures, Candy Quest, Dragon Blast and Dance Party, depending on their grade level. Then, they continued to use Blockly to code various scenarios. Some students learned to click and drag blocks, while others learned about algorithms, nested loops, and other programming functions. Some of our coding involved well known characters from *Ice Age*, *Minecraft*, and *Star Wars*. We were also able to see what the programming language, Java Script, looked like, as we coded. I
