




Basic Skills Instruction News: Mrs. Coyle and Ms. Guider

They also studied Abraham Lincoln on the penny. We cleaned pennies with vinegar, and examined them with magnifying glasses. Both grades learned about, and had fun, flipping pennies. The First graders used tally marks to collect their data. The Second graders also completed a more difficult Valentine's Day glyph. We have now begun our storybook STEM unit. Second graders are coming up with alternative solutions to the tale of *The Three Billy Goats Gruff*. Stay tuned for more information on these fun lessons. The Third grade Gifted and Talented students have started their Rosie Revere Engineer unit. They created visual definitions for higher level vocabulary. Library News: Ms. Raimo


The students are learning about "The Iditarod: The Last Great Race." (I-dit-a-rod). The Iditarod is an annual dog sled race held in Alaska on the first Saturday in March. It

begins in Anchorage, and ends in Nome, which is 1,049 miles long. Alaskan history is the inspiration for this event. In January 1925, a fast-growing epidemic was stopped, and many children were saved by the heroic actions of Dr. Welch, a fearless group of dog mushers, and their sled dogs. Also, the people of Alaska want to keep the tradition of dog sledding alive. Students are learning about the elements that make up the race, which include mushers, dogs, weather conditions, and other hardships on the trail. *The 48th Iditarod Race will be held on Saturday, March 7, 2020.*










Music News: Mr. Arendt

In the days when there was slavery in the United States, there were kind people, who formed a network to help slaves escape their terrible conditions. The hiding places they provided along the escape route became known as the Underground Railroad. To get the freedom message to the slaves, "Peg Leg Joe" would teach them this song. It was a simple song that they could remember. The drinkin' gourd represented the big dipper, which looks like a cup with a handle. The cup's handle points to the North Star. They would follow the North Star at night, which would ultimately lead them north to freedom.

Helpful Hints for Parents to Foster Your Child's Language Development At Home

As a parent, you play an important role in your child's language development. By asking

the right kinds of questions, you can encourage language interactions. In addition to stimulating language development, good question-asking can improve your child's thinking skills. Good questioning will require your child to organize information, and solve problems. There are four types of good questions: "choice" questions ("Do you want



to play soccer or baseball?"); "open-ended" questions ("What happened?"); "thinking" questions ("Why is the girl crying?"); and "cause-effect" questions ("What happened to the milk?")

In Technology class, the Pre-K, Kindergarten, and First graders are learning to navigate

the Web and search using Google Chrome. They searched for PBSkids.org, and then spent time playing some really fun, educational games with a Sesame Street or Dr. Seuss theme.
