The Occupational Therapy students have been working on fun fine motor Thanksgiving crafts! They also have been engaging in educational sensory activities in their classes!









The Lincoln School students are learning to be computer programmers! This month, in Technology class, we have been working on our Computer




Science unit. The programming languages we are using are called Blockly and Java

Lincoln School has been experiencing a "Rock, Paper, Scissors" frenzy during Physical Education classes. Students have been taught how to "Throw" out their hands with the correct timing, and which "Signs" beat each other. In the beginning stages, students would battle the computer, and have to perform exercises that corresponded to a win, lose, or tie. Classes then had the opportunity to play "RPS" in a more team oriented environment. Teams would try to score as many points as they could, by hopping through hula hoops to meet an opponent. Then the two students would have a "Rock, Paper, Scissors" battle, until a winner was decided. The winning player could continue hopping, trying to reach the final hula hoop, and then a point would be recorded for their team. The gym was filled with students cheering their teammates on to win every battle! Students continue to

participate in "The Final Five Minute Focus." Using a big smart board on the stage, students follow along to an array of videos aimed at lowering their heart rate, and calming themselves down. Mindfulness activities and yoga are used to refocus students to be prepared to reenter the classroom setting.

During Health classes, the older students have been learning about different systems of the body, such as the muscular system, and respiratory system. During the muscular system lesson, students learned how the muscular system functions in relation to the rest of the body, and how muscles allow your body to move the skeletal system. Students had the opportunity to use an exercise band to perform bicep curls, to see and feel their bicep muscles moving and contracting.



Students have been engaged in a variety of lessons as well as group discussions. We have also been working on grammar, to improve our writing skills.

In Math, the students are working on addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division facts. We are also working on all operations of decimals, rational numbers, plotting points on the coordinate plane, and word problems. Students are busy working on memorizing their basic facts. They are using IXL, Quizizz, Prodigy Math, and Kahoot to assist in learning. The students have been working hard to master their skills. We are so proud of them, and all of their hard work!

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
