

been working so hard on their charcoal drawing portraits of their favorite people and characters. We can't wait for you to see all of our hard work!






Drive, and Google Docs. They are learning to create a new document, type in

Prior to the February Break, all students participated in an "Olympics" unit. Older students learned some basic rules of Ice Hockey, and played a version of Hockey using Pillo-Polo sticks. Students used the sticks just like a Hockey stick, however the stick has a big foam cushion on the end, to prevent injuries. Teams tried to pass the ball from teammate to teammate, eventually trying to score a goal by hitting the "puck" into the goal. Students also participated in some "Bobsledding" events. By placing a folded mat on a few scooters, the bobsled was built, and students would try to push the bobsled further than their opponents, down the gym floor! Currently, the younger students have begun a unit on throwing and catching. Students will learn the correct way to throw and catch a ball, through participating





in various activities. Older

students have begun a Basketball unit in which they will learn how to dribble, pass, and shoot the basketball. The first activity, Sideline Box Ball, saw groups of students running to the middle of the floor to retrieve a basketball. Then each student took a shot, and points were tallied. The first team to return to their sideline, and have everyone seated, earned an extra point!

After learning about the Olympics and Paralympics during Health class, students once again started to learn the rules and regulations of team sports, such as Baseball, Basketball and Soccer. Through BrainPop, students watched a movie and collectively completed a quiz and challenge worksheet.

engaged in a variety of lessons, as well as group discussions. We have also been working on grammar, to improve our writing skills.

In Math, students are working on addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division facts. We are also working on



addition and subtraction with regrouping, solving algebraic equations, and adding and

subtracting fractions. Students are using IXL, Quizizz, Prodigy Math, and Kahoot! to assist in learning. The students have been working hard to master their skills. We are so proud of them and all of their hard work!



In Spanish classes, we are learning about family members, numbers 0-100, -ar regular ending verbs, school supplies, classroom objects, and parts of the house. Students are having a lot of fun learning about family members. They learned the verb <u>tener</u> - <u>to have</u>, and they are asking each other how many brothers, sisters, cousins, etc. they have.



They are also engaged in dialogues asking and answering questions about parts of the house. Students are reading comic stories, and




are able to identify different types of houses, and describe family members. As a daily routine, students read cultural articles, and play games on Quizizz, Rockalingua, and other websites.



March is off to a great start in our Gifted and Talented/Enrichment program. The Kindergarten classes are listening to *How to Catch a Leprechaun,* by Adam Wallace, and working in teams to plan and build



Leprechaun traps made out of various building materials. The First Grade is reading a Ukrainian folktale called



The Mitten. Students are then designing and creating their own mitten, which we will be using to explore measurement. The Second Graders created March STEAM Journals, and will be using the Engineering Design Process to complete March STEAM activities. Up first will be designing and

building pattern rainbows that can stand using cereal, pipe cleaners, and playdough. Third Grade G & T students will be embarking on a new unit in which they will design and build a tiny house. We will study area, perimeter, and geometry in the process. Grades Four and Five students have finally completed their original learning board games, and will share and play them in the coming week. Finally, the Sixth Grade G & T students are studying mythical creatures. They will use works of art to study the characteristics of a selected mythical creature, in order to design a trap that will capture the creature for scientists to study, and release back into the wild.
