

are making a connection in their brains about sound and spelling patterns. We wish everyone a healthy spring.



In Technology class, the Kindergarten and First Graders are continuing to navigate through Google. They are searching for websites, such as ABCya.com and PBSkids.org, and then spending time working on some really fun and educational games. The Second and Third Graders are



continuing to learn all about



Google Drive, and Google Docs. They are creating a document, typing in it, and then doing things like copying, cutting, and pasting. They are also learning how to work with different fonts, font sizes, colors, and the highlighter.

After that, they are having some fun inserting images, and creating

drawings in Google Docs. The Fifth and Sixth Grades will work on creating arrays, or tables, on Google Sheets. We will track our data, and then create various graphs to represent the data.

Students in Physical Education class have begun a Fitness Unit to coincide with a similar unit about Exercise and Fitness, in Health class. In Gym, students have begun to participate in the "Pacer Test." The Pacer Test is an aerobic capacity test that starts off slowly and progressively gets faster and faster. Students must run back and forth across the gym, and make it to each side of the gym before an alarm sounds. Students can either participate for as long as they want, or until they can longer make it to a side, before the alarm sounds. As we

progress through the unit, students will have other opportunities to improve on their personal scores!

In Health class, students have been learning the importance of exercise, and the importance of their overall fitness levels. Older students learned how the playground, right here at Lincoln School, can be used to get a great resistance workout, by using the different apparatus found on the playground. Students continue to participate in "The Final Five Minute Focus." Using a big SmartBoard on the stage, students follow along to an array of videos aimed at lowering their heart rate, and calming themselves down. Mindfulness activities and yoga are used to refocus students to be prepared to reenter the classroom setting.

The students are busy learning many new concepts, as well as reviewing previous learned material. They are also busy filling our Kindness Bucket with letters to their friends, with words of encouragement and positivity. In ELA, we have been working on guided reading, complete sentences, fragments, run-ons, comparing and contrasting texts, supporting our answers with text evidence, studying figurative language, and identifying author's purpose. Students have been engaged in a variety of lessons, as well as group discussions. We have also

been working on grammar, to improve our writing skills.

In Math, students are working on addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division facts. We are also working on addition and subtraction with regrouping, solving algebraic equations, adding, subtracting, multiplying fractions, and ratios and percents. Students are using IXL, Quizizz, Prodigy Math, and Kahoot! to assist in learning. The students have been working hard to master their skills. We are so proud of them, and all of their hard work!




Practice Makes Perfect!

Combining Social/Emotional Learning with STEAM has been the recent focus for Kindergarten enrichment classes. The students heard *Goldilocks and the Three Bears* by Mara Alperin. In this version of the classic story, the



characters' feelings are very clear. We discussed the different perspectives, and brainstormed other ways to solve the problems presented in the story. The students then designed and built Goldilocks her very own bed, and baby bear a new chair. First Grade students continued their lesson



on nonstandard measurement. They used the mittens that they created to measure things around the room. They even measured their friends! We also were introduced to the concept

of capacity. The Second Graders have continued their March STEAM project series. This week the students participated in a tower

building challenge, using toothpicks and clay. Third and Fourth Grade G & T students are continuing to design and build tiny houses, studying area, perimeter,



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and geometry in the process. They are also learning to design from different



perspectives. Students in Fifth Grade G & T have started on a "Picture Books for All" unit. Students will create written narratives to accompany wordless books. This writing challenge will encourage and allow for freedom of expression, and a wide range of interpretation. Finally, the Sixth Grade G & T students

continue studying mythical creatures. They are creating Google Slide presentations to teach about their chosen creatures. The students will then design and build a model of a trap that will contain their creature, without causing them any harm.
