Physical Education classes have begun a unit on Soccer. Students have learned how to kick the ball with their “in-step,” or inside part of their foot, to make a pass or take a shot. Using other skills, such as trapping the ball, younger students played a very fun activity called “Soccer Noodle Tag.” In this game, there are few

“Taggers” who attempt to tag students with a pool noodle. Once tagged, students are frozen until a classmate passes them a soccer ball, and they successfully trap the ball, allowing them back into the game. Older students have been playing “Side-Line Soccer.” Two teams line up on each side of the gym, and four students from each team come to the middle to play a 4 vs. 4 soccer game. The sideline players are still part of the game, and can pass the ball to teammates when they receive the ball on the sideline.



The World Cup has been the focus of Health classes. The history and progression of the World Cup was discussed, as was the patriotism that each country exhibits during the tournament. Students learned how the World Cup starts with 32 teams, in the “Group Stage,” and progresses through the “Elimination Rounds,” to end with one World Champion.

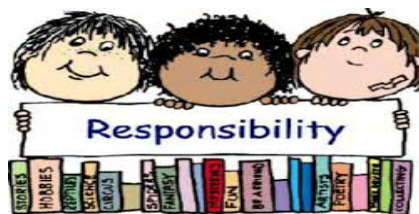
Ms. Hahn and Mrs. Morrison



The students are busy learning many new concepts, as well as reviewing previous learned material. They are also busy filling our Kindness Bucket with letters to their friends, with words of encouragement and positivity. Students have been taking practice tests, and practicing skills for the state test, coming up next month. In ELA, we have been working on guided reading, complete sentences, fragments, run-ons,

comparing and contrasting texts, supporting our answers with text evidence, studying figurative language, studying nonfiction texts, and expository writing. Students have been engaged in a variety of lessons, as well as group discussions. We have also been working on grammar to improve our writing skills.

In Math, students are working on shapes, line plots, fractions and decimals, multiplying and dividing fractions, unit rates, and percents. Students are using IXL, Quizizz, Prodigy Math, and Kahoot! to assist in learning. The students have been working hard to master their skills. We are so proud of them, and all of their hard work! 😊

In Spanish classes, we are learning about the weather, numbers 0-1000, Hispanic countries' geography, their capitals, and a few cultural aspects, such as food, famous athletes, and artists. Students are having a lot of fun learning

about weather expressions. They are working on a mini-project, making a seven-day weather forecast on construction paper. Students are using numbers in many concepts, such as to tell their age, date, year, and perform mathematical operations. They are also

engaged in dialogues asking and answering questions about Latin American countries. For example: *¿Cuál es la capital de Perú?* - *La capital de Perú es Lima*. Students are reading comic stories, and are able to identify different types of weather expressions. As a daily routine, students read cultural articles, and play games on Quizizz, Quia, Rockalingua, and other websites.

The Kindergarten learned all about tunnels and tubes! We read a book, and identified different tunnels and tubes that we see and use in our daily lives. The students also enjoyed crawling



through a tunnel! First and Second Grade students were introduced to tangrams. We read *Grandfather Tang's Story*, by Ann Tompert. This is a folktale told using ancient Chinese puzzles called tangrams. Third and Fourth Grade G & T students are continuing to design and build tiny houses, studying area, perimeter, and geometry in the process. They are also learning to design from different



perspectives. Students in Fifth Grade G & T have finished up their "Picture Books for All" unit. The students created written narratives to accompany wordless books, and shared their best story with our class. This writing

challenge encouraged freedom of expression and creativity. Finally, the Sixth Grade G & T students continue studying mythical creatures. They have created Google Slide presentations to teach about their chosen creatures. Students are now designing and building a model of their creature, as well as a trap that will contain their creature, without causing them any harm.
