
on Historical Fiction. They just finished reading Number the Stars, by Lois Lowry, and thoroughly enjoyed it! Learning about





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will work cooperatively to successfully complete digital Math Escape Rooms, and create representations of statistical data.




In Science, the students designed and engineered their

Motion to the test. Students

observed that a force is
required to set an object in
motion, and stop it. The force
that causes a balloon vehicle



to move is the air expelled from the balloon through a narrow tube or straw. As the air forcefully moves backward from the car, it pushes the vehicle forward.





of your hard work and support throughout the year!






We are still working hard in Sixth Grade, learning about The Cherokee Nation in America. Last week, we focused on the government's poor treatment of Native Americans, and their journey on "The Trail of Tears." We will learn about slavery in America, and abolitionists in the last two weeks.

In our Historical Fiction novel, the Watson Family is traveling to Birmingham, Alabama, and is keeping us entertained along the way. We are focusing on how important setting is in Historical Fiction, and that setting drives the conflict. The students have been reflecting on our readings daily, and are doing an excellent job with critical

thinking, and making connections. In Writing, the students are working on a Document Based Question (DBQ), on the importance of freedom of the press in a democracy. They are analyzing political cartoons, quotes from notable Americans, and maps, to gain evidence for their essay. This will really prepare them for Civics in Seventh Grade, as well as future research papers. I am so proud of the progress our Sixth Graders made this year!
