we are learning all about nocturnal animals. Our reading skills are improving every day, and our sight word walk keeps growing! Math is full of ten frames, adding and money! Happy November!



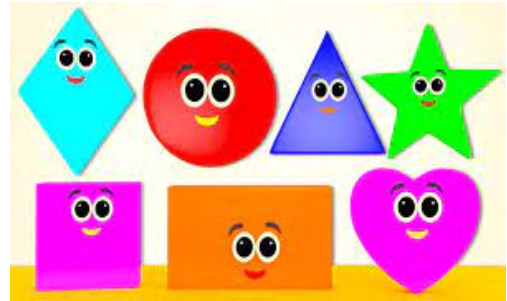


## Ms. K. Lane, Ms. Sinclair, and Ms. J. Jackson



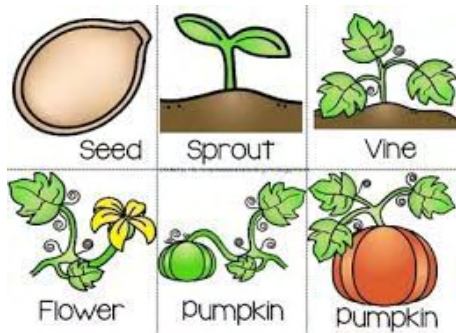

events. Thank you to our amazing PTA for all they do to make our days memorable!





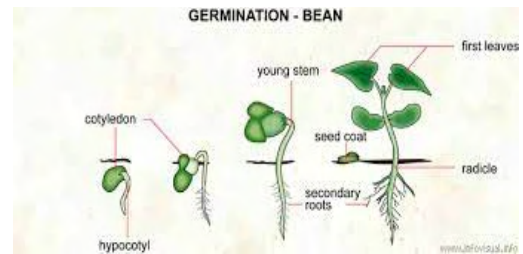
## Mrs. Cruz Betesh, Mrs. Houston, and Ms. Schupak

are making predictions of what will happen to the bean when it is placed in water for 24 hours, or when it is
