


# Ms. Conticello and Ms. Elborki



languages we are using are called Blockly and Java Script, and involve creating code using

blocks. We will start with the Hour of Code, which includes Puppy Adventure, Beaver Achiever, Dragon Blast,



Minecraft Adventurer, Dance Party, Star Wars, and Al for Oceans, depending on their grade

level. We are going to continue to work on coding to learn more about programming, and to see how games and apps are created. We have some very talented programmers in our school!

Both Health and Physical Education Classes have caught "The Bug" - THE WORLD CUP BUG! 


### Mrs. Morris

Next up, the Second Graders designed and built beautiful Totem Poles to represent their lives. The



Third Grade classes finished their unit on Morse Code. The Fourth Graders have begun planning their own original comic strips. These comics depict the short story of a real life



hero. In this unit, students discuss and focus on what makes a person heroic.
