






Our students have continued to work hard and challenge themselves to be the best they can be. We have loved watching them grow and develop both socially and academically. The students are actively participating in lessons and discussions, which is contributing to a positive learning





environment. In ELA, we have been working on guided

reading, story elements, reading strategies, grammar, sentence structure, and developing our writing. Students have been engaged in a variety of lessons, as well as group discussions. We completed our second group novel studies, in which students are reading books like *Frindle*, *Junie B. Jones*, and the *My Weird School* series! In addition, our students will start their opinion writing letters next month, where they will be able to develop their creative writing and descriptive writing skills, to create a review of a toy they have or received over the break. 

short story of a real life hero. In this unit, students discuss and focus on what makes a person heroic. The Fifth Graders continue their Forensic Science unit, "Who Stole the Chocolate," completing weekly labs to find out who the culprit is. Students in Grade 6 are completing a STEAM project called "Trap a Mythical Creature." The students will use works of art and literacy to study the characteristics of a selected mythical creature, and build a model of a trap.







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
