











conversations, describing, and taking turns. Our older students have been using

work on their own. Just be sure they sign into the program, so it records their completed work. The more we code, the better we get! I wish you all a Happy and Healthy New Year!



what makes a person heroic. Students in Fifth Grade G & T have started working on a "Picture Books for All" unit. Students will create written narratives to accompany wordless books. This writing






