



truly outstanding. With two weeks left of school, Measurement


authors and learned much about this sobering time in history. As a fun writing activity, they are writing to the










In Math, the students are working on a digital road trip across the country. The road trip requires students to work independently and together to successfully arrive at their destination. Students are using the skills that they have learned throughout the school year to read and display data, and determine their location, distance, and travel costs. In the upcoming weeks, students will work cooperatively to complete digital math escape rooms and create representations of statistical data.

In Science, we are closing out our unit on living things, what they need to survive, and how they are classified. Students learned about infectious agents, such as viruses and bacteria. Students gained a deeper understanding of the characteristics of living things. They enjoyed creating a mural inspired by the






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### Mrs. Centrella

In Reading, we started our Historical Fiction novel, *The Watsons Go to Birmingham - 1963*, by Christopher Paul Curtis. The Watson Family is traveling to Birmingham, Alabama, and they kept us entertained along the way. We are focusing on how important setting is in historical fiction and that the setting drives the conflict. At the end of the novel, we will learn about a historic event in our country that often gets overlooked. It will inform us of social justice issues and elicit necessary discussions about racism and segregation. The students have been reflecting on our



readings daily and are doing an excellent job writing responses that involve critical thinking and making connections. Students have also launched their book clubs. They are focusing on

thinking while reading and tracking new and important vocabulary within their groups.

In Social Studies, the students wrapped up their Asian and Pacific Islander research by highlighting the impact these men and women had on American society. We also spent time reading about slavery in the United States, as well as abolition. The students are learning that while there is never a justification

for slavery, it's imperative to study the history of the

past, to help make choices today, to guide tomorrow. We must learn from the past and speak up when we see injustice in our present and future. I am so proud of the progress our Sixth Graders made this year! Remember to have a happy and safe summer, and most importantly... *Keep Reading!*
