scenes, and our own mittens. We have also been playing Yeti in my Spaghetti and Don't Break the Ice. Winter has been fun so far in PT and OT!






to having an amazing new year with all of our students!

Our Fifth Grade Discussion Groups are in full gear! The students chose specific topics that they would like




to discuss in more detail and invited


youngest person to ever receive the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964, and more than 730 streets in America are named for him? Also, did you know he entered college at the

winter scenes for Peter to play in! Grade 1 students heard *The Giving Snowman*, by Julia Zheng and enjoyed using model magic to make their own snowmen and retell the story. 
snowflakes are hexagonal and symmetrical and created

to teach about their chosen creatures. The students will then design and build a model of a trap that will contain their creature without causing them any harm.



We would like to congratulate our students for working so hard on the district LinkIt! assessments last week. Your tenacity and perseverance are inspiring. In ELA, we are



learning about similes and metaphors. We are also learning how to cite relevant evidence from the text in our writing. This week, we have begun to write opinion pieces on a variety of topics. Several students have been describing and comparing the games Roblox and Minecraft. Several other students are describing and comparing Spiderman to



Batman, or slime to playdough. Our Second and Third Grade students just finished reading *My Teacher Fried My Brains*, by Bruce Covile. This exciting book follows the adventures of

Susan, Peter, and Duncan as they work together to discover which of their middle school teachers is a space alien in disguise! We have also been drawing pictures and writing sentences to summarize each chapter of the book.

The students have been working hard in Math. They are mastering their facts and applying them to their work. The students are working on money, addition and subtraction with regrouping, and word problems. Other students are working on multiplication and division facts. The students continue to work on decimals and all operations including applying their knowledge to solve word problems. We also are working on writing equations and solving them with all operations. Students continue to use IXL and other games to assist in learning.



After the holiday break, the students participated in an array of activities that focused on improving cardiovascular endurance. We discussed New Year's resolutions and why such a high percentage of them fail. The students were allowed a "Free Gym" period in which students could use an assortment of equipment to find activities that they enjoyed, with the hopes that they would continue to exercise in 2024.

Physical Education and Health classes also combined themes to discuss the topic of the heart. Health classes learned about the heart and how it functions within our body, while the Gym classes focused on strengthening the heart through jumping rope and the



"Pacer" Test. The Pacer Test is a multistage aerobic



capacity test that starts off slow and progressively gets harder. Students start on one side of the gym and, on a signal, they run to the other side before the signal rings again. The interval between bells slowly gets shorter and shorter. Although called the Pacer Test, students are not graded on what level they reach, rather the focus is on individual growth on future participation in the Pacer Test!
